

St Michael's Church, which is currently the parish church, was first mentioned in the late 14th century, although it certainly originated earlier. It used to be located at the foot of the castle, which disappeared in the 15th century. Two other churches, those of St Peter of Pupiane to the north and of St Quinidius to the south, were the seats of small parishes that ceased to be in the late Middle Ages. In the 16th century, St Michael's became the parish seat. The building has been reshaped several times. The initial construction, comprising a single nave and a choir (with a semi-circular or straight-ended apse), was extended by the addition of side chapels and a vestry. In the 19th century its nave was extended eastward, with the choir thus repositioned to the west. The west entrance was removed. The whitewashed interior is understated. The choir decoration probably dates from the 19th century, while the oldest decoration (17th century) is in the Chapel of the Virgin Mary. Paintings and stained-glass windows complete the interior decoration of the church.
